



Livestock Farm Management: Sheep and Goat Feeding, Breeding and Flock Performance

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Introduction:

Livestock farm management on sheep and goat holdings often runs on habit: rations are mixed without a feed budget, ewes and does enter mating in poor condition, lambing and kidding losses go unrecorded, heat stress cuts intake through the hot months and feed bills rise faster than sale prices. This Core Concept course gives people who run small ruminant flocks the routines to plan housing, water and shade, balance rations, manage the breeding calendar, keep flock records and control cost per animal. Participants build a Flock Management and Feeding Plan with a Farm Budget.

Course Objectives:

- Classify sheep and goat production systems and match breed type, stocking rate and housing layout to a hot, dry operating environment
- Formulate rations and a seasonal feed budget from available forages and concentrates, and track feed cost per head
- Apply body condition scoring and a breeding calendar to plan mating groups, lambing and kidding, and weaning
- Maintain flock records and calculate performance indicators such as weaning rate, daily liveweight gain and mortality
- Implement biosecurity, hygiene, welfare and handling routines agreed with the farm veterinarian
- Produce a Flock Management and Feeding Plan with a Farm Budget, sale plan and staff duty roster

Target Audience:

- Owners who run sheep or goat holdings and decide on stock numbers, feed purchases and sales
 - Farm managers responsible for daily flock routines, feed stores and facility upkeep
 - Livestock supervisors who lead shepherds and farm workers through feeding, breeding and handling tasks
 - Agricultural development and extension staff who advise small ruminant producers
 - Cooperative and producer group coordinators who organise feed supply and animal marketing for members

- Compare practice with owners, supervisors and advisers who run flocks under different systems and climates

Conclusion:

Sheep and goat holdings stay profitable when housing, water, rations, breeding and records are managed as one routine. The week moves from production systems, breeds and flock structure, through shade, water, heat stress and feeding principles, to ration formulation, feed budgets, body condition scoring and the breeding calendar. It then covers identification, performance indicators, biosecurity, work with the veterinarian, welfare and staff duties, and closes with a costing build that produces a Flock Management and Feeding Plan with a Farm Budget. Clinical diagnosis and treatment remain with the veterinarian.
